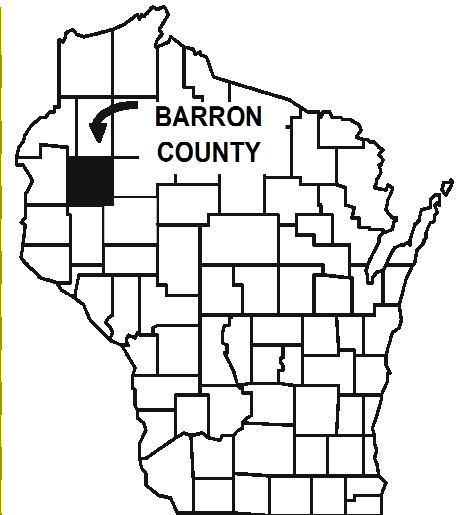

The County offers excellent public and private camping facilities among the many lakes, streams, and County forests. The many lakes of Barron County are known for outdoor activities, including fishing, camping, and pleasure boating. County forest land is in abundance around many of the County's lakes and offers sightseers a variety of wildlife. Barron County offers excellent canoeing and boating, especially along the Red Cedar River. The Blue Hills, located in the northeastern part of the county, are especially beautiful in autumn to hikers, cyclists, and motorists alike.

Miscellaneous

HIGHWAYS—Barron County is served by a network of U.S. and State Highways. U.S. Highways 53 and 63, and State Highway 25, run north and south through the County. U.S. Highway 53 is a four-lane highway. U.S. Highway 8 and State Highway 48 run east and west.

RAIL SERVICE—Barron County is served by Canadian National (CN). The CN serves the communities of Almena, Barron, Cameron, and Rice Lake. The CN connects with the Wisconsin Northern (WN) rail line runs south through Chetek to Chippewa Falls to provide shippers with nationwide access. CN has reactivated a 40-mile stretch of long-inactive line between Ladysmith and Poskin, to serve the Superior Silica Sand Corporation processing plant west of Barron.

AIR SERVICE—Barron County has four publicly-owned airports. Two medium general aviation airports are located near Cumberland and Chetek. A small general aviation airport is located near Barron. All of these facilities have paved runways over 3,400 feet in length, except Barron which has a 2,000 foot turf runway. The Rice Lake Airport is a large general aviation facility and is located to the west of Cameron. The Rice Lake Airport has a 6,700 foot runway and a 3,500 foot runway, both asphalt, and maintains a fixed base operator providing fuel and mechanic services. Air taxi and daily air freight services are also available.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES—Most training needs among local businesses are met by the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College located in Rice Lake. Associate degree and vocational education programs are offered in the areas of agriculture; service and health; business management; trade and industry; and general education, as well as apprenticeship trades. UW-Barron County is a two-year university center in Rice Lake providing college-level curriculum for area residents.
