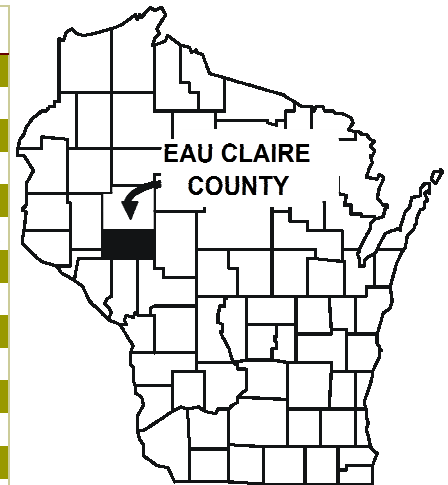

An asset to Eau Claire County, the 200+ acre Beaver Creek Reserve, an environmental education and interpretative center, encompasses the Eau Claire Youth Camp, Wise Nature Center, and Hobbs Observatory. The Chippewa River Recreation Trail winds along the Chippewa River and connects with the Red Cedar State Trail to provide a scenic recreational trail system of approximately 80 miles that, when fully completed, will connect Menomonie, Durand, Eau Claire, Chippewa Falls, and Cornell. Eau Claire County also has seven wonderful county parks that offer beaches, fishing, camping, boating, and much more.

Located in the center of the City of Eau Claire, the 132-acre Carson Park is surrounded by Half Moon Lake and features a sports stadium and athletic fields, lighted tennis courts, horseshoe courts, the Chippewa Valley Museum, and the Paul Bunyan Logging Camp and Interpretive Center. The City also operates a zero-depth outdoor swimming pool and 155 ft. water slide and organizes many softball, volleyball, basketball, soccer, gymnastics and other recreation leagues. The Chippewa and Eau Claire Rivers provide some of the most beautiful rural and urban areas for the enjoyment of its residents and visitors.

Miscellaneous

HIGHWAYS—Eau Claire County is served by an extensive network of Interstate, U.S. and State Trunk Highways. I-94, USH 53 and access to STH 29 form the backbone of this 4-lane system, providing ready access in every direction. In addition, USH 12, STH 37, STH 93, STH 312 and STH 124 provide a high quality secondary road network connecting local communities to the Eau Claire Urban Area.

RAIL SERVICE—The Union Pacific Railroad serves Altoona, Augusta, Eau Claire, Fairchild and Fall Creek with a mainline connection between Minneapolis-St. Paul and Chicago.

AIR SERVICE—The Chippewa Valley Regional Airport on the north side of the City of Eau Claire is a scheduled commercial service facility meeting the following specifications: *Elevation:* 907; *Runways:* 8,000 ft. (concrete) and 5,000 ft. (concrete/asphalt); *Lights:* HIRL, MIRL; *NavAids:* ILS, FSS, REIL, NDS; and a navigational tower. United Airlines/SkyWest Airlines currently connects Eau Claire with O'Hare International Airport in Chicago with two daily flights.

BUS SERVICE—Greyhound intercity bus lines connect Eau Claire to major cities along I-94. Jefferson Lines provides additional service between the Twin Cities and Green Bay along the STH 29 corridor, a stop at UW-Eau Claire. The Eau Claire City Transit System operates 22 buses on fifteen routes in the cities of Eau Claire and Altoona. The buses operate from 6:00 am to 10:00 pm, Monday-Friday; 8:00 am to 6:00 pm on Saturdays.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES—The University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire offers over 40 major undergraduate programs in arts and science, nursing, teaching, and business administration, and also has a School of Graduate Studies. The Chippewa Valley Technical College serves the technical training needs of the entire area with numerous associate degree and vocational education programs.
